Overcoming Enemies of Faith PASTOR JIM

When I was in seminary, I took an elective course in developing genograms. A genogram is similar to a family tree except the genogram includes diseases, social habits, and a variety of other traits and issues that impact one's life. The benefit to knowing this type of information is that it can in part explain why you do the things you do. It may also help you to identify your weaknesses and strengths. This will in turn help you to grow and mature in your faith and practice as a Christian. One of the great challenges for Christians is to maintain their focus upon the things of God. Remember, Jesus challenges His disciples, you and me, "Seek first His [God's] kingdom and His righteousness, and all these things [you need] will be added to you" (Matthew 6:33).

I encourage you to develop a genogram-like chart for yourself. At this point, do not include family or relatives. Just make this chart (genogram) about you. So, stop what you are doing for a moment and reflect upon your practices and habits. Create a chart dividing your habits, practices, and attitudes into two categories. Make the first category "Destroying Faith." Now make the second category "Building Faith."

Your chart may look something like this:

Destroying Faith Excessive busyness at church	Building Faith Meaningful participation In church
Constant worry	Constant prayer
Focus on things of the world	Focus on things of God

This chart only contains six items; nonetheless, it serves as an example for you to develop your own chart.

Once you have your chart, examine the balance. How many of the entries onto your chart help to destroy or hinder your faith, and how many are building or encouraging your faith? This is valuable information that once analyzed can help you to put your life into balance so your faith will mature in a healthy way.

The purpose of this small exercise is to first show how our lives can get out of balance. Second, this chart reveals the healthy practices and attitudes which one can build upon to strengthen their faith.

Now make a second chart with three categories. Keep the first two categories the same. Make "Corrective Action" the third column heading. It should look something like this:

Destroying Faith Excessive busyness at church	Building Faith Meaningful participation In church	Corrective Action Participate in worship
Constant worry	Constant prayer	Focused prayer
Focus on things of the world	Focus on things of God	Mission activity

The third category should help narrow what you are doing to be more targeted and specific. This will help to mature your faith. Give it a try. You may be surprised at what you discover about yourself.

Supporting Gate Beautiful

How can MacPherson Church support the work of Gate Beautiful? This was the question to be answered on March 20 as Shelby Thompson, Operations Director, visited the Express



Meal to describe the work of Gate Beautiful.

Gate Beautiful is the only organization in Cumberland County focused on those victimized by and associated with human trafficking. According to the Department of Homeland Security, "Human trafficking involves the use of force, fraud, or coercion to obtain some type of labor or commercial sex act." Human trafficking is a significant issue in Fayetteville and Cumberland County.

Gate Beautiful provides victim advocates immediately after men and women are rescued from human trafficking. They provide immediate material resources to human trafficking victims (clothes, toiletries), and—most importantly—they spread awareness of human trafficking indicators to the general public. (You may see human trafficking but not know what you are seeing.) MacPherson could support this work in a variety of ways. Evangelism and Mission will be discussing these ideas to bring a recommendation to Session. Some of the suggestions include:

- Encourage people to become victim advocates.
- Arrange Prayer Caravans in areas especially vulnerable to human trafficking. (Prayer Caravans drive through neighborhoods and pray.)
- Pray for these vulnerable communities daily.
- Gather supplies to provide to rescued victims (toiletries, change of clothing, undergarments, phone chargers, and Bibles).
- Spread awareness by allowing Gate Beautiful to participate in community events at MacPherson Church (such as Community FallFest).

Behind the Scenes at MacPherson: Faith Freezer Meals

Behind the Scenes articles are written to remind all of us the history and details of programs or activities at Mac-Pherson. This month is no different, except after talking to the usual folks—no one can exactly remember how or when we began the Faith Freezer!

To the best of our collective recollections, it has been between 10-15 years that MacPherson has offered Faith Freezer Meals. The idea may have been introduced at a Presbytery meeting and then shared with the Congrega-

tional Care Team by someone from MacPherson who had attended that meeting.

The premise is simple: People need to eat. When MacPherson had a fellowship meal every Wednesday night, leftovers



were frozen to be given to people in need. In time, the Faith Freezer also started accepting donations of leftovers from congregation members, especially after Mac-Pherson went to one Wednesday night meal a month. As a rule, many of us prepare too much food for our own families to eat. One simple solution for leftovers is to share them with the Faith Freezer.

A special section of the freezer in the big kitchen is designated for these meals. There are labels to put on your freezer-safe container or you can use your own label, indicating the contents and date prepared. Single portions work well, but slightly bigger portions work for big appetites or two people. Remember, you do not have to make a lot of meals. One leftover portion at your house equates to one meal for someone else. Some of these meals go to our own church family; some are given to community members. Either way, meals are appreciated! Contact Liz or Rene with questions—and plan to contribute a Faith Freezer meal soon!

Returning to the Lords Mission

Proverbs 11:24-25 - One gives freely, yet grows all the richer; another withholds what he should give, and only suffers want. Whoever brings blessing will be enriched, and one who waters will himself be watered.

I stated the following a year ago: "Starting in 2019 these last few years have taken a great toll on the nation's Christian Mission work. MacPherson was no exception to these effects, and we cannot just blame the COVID-19 Pandemic. Many of the Evangelism & Mission activities were canceled or postponed due to restrictions and impacts on the foundation of these events as well as the people. It seems no matter where you look or read these days, we see a decline in attendance at churches with many closing around the country. I fear that without Christians giving of themselves to do the Lord's work the Word of God does not reach those in need."

In 2023 we returned to the Cabell-Lincoln Work Camp in West Virginia with several of the youth and adults. All in all, it was very successful, and everyone that attended enjoyed renewed fellowship with Christians from other locations and substantially added to the mission of helping others in need. In 2023, we also began prayerfully searching for a new local mission that MacPherson Church can support in our local community. The E&M Team, I believe, has found just the local mission we need. With God's help and divine guidance we can and will make a big difference in our local community.

I also asked the question in 2023, "What motivates a Christian to volunteer?" I can say without hesitation it is faith. What gives some people the ability to love where others

fail? Faith. *Faith* is the decision to *love*, no matter the circumstances. And the more you choose love, the greater your faith will grow. It is with faith that we go out into the world to share freely the word and love of God.
